It's hard to believe that we are about to enter the last half term of the year. After the disruption to learning in the previous academic year we had hoped for more normality in 2020/21, the good news is that as restrictions are lifted we are slowly moving back to what we call "normal".

We have learnt some valuable lessons from the pandemic and some of the changes that we put in place have worked so well that we will keep them. Having two shorter lunch breaks allows all of the students to use the canteen without long queues and so we will continue to do this.

From Monday Fowey River Academy will have a new member of staff, we will be welcoming "Charlie" who is a four-year-old female Boston terrier. She is an experienced therapy dog and will be working at school each day. If you see her please say hello and make her welcome.

Before we broke up on Friday I ran assemblies with each year group explaining the results from the mobile phone surveys (results shown later in the newsletter) and explaining the rules regarding phones that will be applied when we return. The results from pupils and parents are very clear and this is backed up by national research that phones are a distraction to learning. Many schools have completely banned phones for the whole school day. We are being very clear and are saying that phones are not allowed inside the building at any time (including wet breaks). During break and lunchtime outside they can be used. Can I ask that you support us with this and don't try to contact your children directly during lesson times.

We have also emphasised the uniform rules, with an increase in the temperature there is no longer any need for coats to be worn inside and a reminder that hoodies and jumpers that are not plain black with a v neck may not be worn under or over the blazer. Due to the cost of new uniform we are reminding everybody that from September no students will be permitted to wear black jeans or trainers.

## **SCHOOL NOTICES**



### **MOBILE PHONES**

We recently surveyed parents and students on the impact of phones in school. It's fair to say it gets people pretty fired up and that's why there has been a growing national and international debate on the issue. The results of the survey are fairly resounding and here is a snapshot.

207 parents and 267 students responded.

- 94% of parents think it can lead to instances of bullying
- 1 in 4 students say they or a close friend have been affected by it
- 87% of parents believe restricting phones will lead to better learning outcomes
- almost 50% of students have been in a lesson where phones have caused disruption
- Nearly 80% of parents agree with confiscating phones
- and nearly 60% of students would understand if a phone was confisacted

### **DUTY OF CARE**

The results were fairly resounding and so from next Monday, we will have a much stronger policy for phones in place...check out the video for further info. We have also listened, we understand students may need phones in the evenings so parents can stay in touch, so we will always have a conversation with you before confiscating overnight.



### Online Parents Evenings

To ensure you know how your child is doing and to help us manage the issues around visitors on site and COVID regulations, we have decided to give online parents meetings a go. Lots of schools and colleges have been using this effectively and it can be more practical and effective given our busy lifestyles. We have produced some information which has gone out to you via ParentMail but can also be found here: The key thing to remember is that you need to access FireFly to attend and that you only get 5 minutes for each slot with a teacher!! So make sure you have key questions ready and you can always follow up by email after.

School communication is done via a variety of ways. However, to enable us to get important messages to you, we need you to be signed up and using ParentMail. This is our preferred way of getting important messages to you. There is a handy app which you can download, but to get the most from it, you need notifications to be ON!





FireFly is our way of communicating with students. It's how we set homework. update students on tasks and communicate about a range of school issues. Did you know though that Parents can also use FireFly to keep an eye on their childs work? FireFly for parents also gives you access to the virtual parents evenings, so you'll need to be able to access FireFly to participate. Details have been sent to you via ParentMail but can be found here.



### UNIFORM

As we start to get back to full normality, school uniform also needs to get back to normal. We know that some parents would like to see an end to school uniform, but there are lots of good reasons for keeping a school uniform, not least the pressure it places on students to keep up with their peers and the latest



### SCIENCE

Year 7 are currently studying the Blue Planet, which is all about life on Earth. They are starting with an introduction to the cycles that aid life, eg water cycle. They will be learning about how the Earth's atmosphere was formed and how that shaped how life has evolved, to the growth of plants and investigating how to sample the planet for different species abundance. We are currently working to develop a collaborative project with the Beach Guardian from Cornwall wildlife to investigate the abundance of plastic on a local beach comparatively with the species abundance and distribution, which will hope will be an exciting project involving the whole of Year 7 later this year.

Year 8 are currently studying the science of human development, human reproduction and contraception, and genetics and the structure of DNA. Although there is little practical work involved with these topics, it is fascinating to learn and think more deeply about where we have all come from, and what makes us what we are.

Year 10 are studying "Life in the Universe" at the moment, which builds on the ecology that the Year 7s are currently learning about. Year 10 are looking at how competition, interdependence and many other factors affect habitats and the abundance of species, and the impact that humans can have. Our Science pond is teeming with a huge diversity of species, which they will be investigating by doing some pond dipping.





On Monday 10th May some of our Year 9 students made plastic from seaweed, as part of a Future Scientist Project from the Royal Society of Chemistry in collaboration with Libby Challoner, a student from Falmouth University who is studying Sustainable Product Design, and Janine Bisson who is a STEM coordinator for Cornwall Council. The day began with a talk by Andrew Wallis, the Head of School and College Partnerships at Falmouth University, who gave us an overview of the wide range of exciting hands-on and creative opportunities and facilities that there are at Falmouth University. There were several really good questions about the facilities and opportunities at Falmouth, for example in game design and film editing and several students expressed a keen interest in finding out more; we are in the process of arranging visits for Year 9 to the Falmouth campus so they can see the university facilities at first hand - watch this space!

Libby explained to us her path from doing science A-levels to doing a BA in Sustainable Product Design at Falmouth, where she is in her final year. She told us about the course and a variety of the hands-on projects that she and fellow students have done. Libby's final year project is to develop techniques to produce to make biodegradable plastics from materials extracted from seaweed. Our Year 9s were able to have a hands-on go at copying this process to make their own plastics, and then to experiment further for themselves by varying the mixtures to produce harder or softer plastics. These plastics are biodegradable or dissolve in water - and we are likely to see a lot more of them in packaging and materials soon, as they replace the oil-based plastics that are currently used, and which will pollute our environment for many years.

The main compound that goes into making "seaweed plastic" is agar, which is a water soluble substance that can be dried into a powder or mixed with water to form a gel. It takes Libby several weeks to extract agar from seaweed, so we bought in agar to use. The agar powder is mixed into a jelly, and combined with cornstarch and vegetable glycerine, and food dyes, to produce a plastic. Pupils managed to make a variety of plastics, ranging from opaque, hard and brittle, to translucent jelly-like plastics, and even some flexible plastic sheets. There has been a lot of interest from other pupils, so we will be rolling this activity out more widely. This experiment is great fun to do and can be done at home, particularly as the materials are easy to obtain - however, it can be dangerous as the agar needs heating, and it can easily get extremely hot (and sticks to the skin) so can cause really nasty burns and scalds. Although we have a safe method to use at school with supervision, our advice has to be not to try this experiment at home.





### **STEAM - Rockets**

Miss Bryan and Mr Walmisley have restarted our redesigned STEAM club for Year 7. One of their projects was to design and construct bottle rockets using recycled bottles and 3D printed parts. To begin, the group looked at the engineering concepts involved; aero dynamics were used in the construction of the 3D printed nose cones along with guidance fins for stability, all printed on site using a PLA 3D printer. These were then combined to form the basic shape of the rockets. The propellant used was hydrogen which was generated in class and used to fill the bottles, ready for launch. The testing phase saw the rockets ignited using a sophisticated launch platform (an inclined piece of gutter and modified hand-held cooker ignitor to produce a spark to ignite the hydrogen/air mixture). All rockets launched successfully - with some going further than others. We might take this project further, to investigate why some rockets flew further than others; was it aerodynamics, the hydrogen/air mix or some other factor?

Over the next half term we will be exploring the use of electronics. We will be looking at different types of circuits including amplifiers and transformers to drive external components. The focus is to understand resistance and capacitance of circuits so that they can create their own tone generators and amplifiers.

ENGLISH

Our Year 11 cohort have been practising and perfecting their persuasive writing skills over lockdown. They were tasked to consider their personal views on whether the death penalty should be reintroduced to our country or kept in the past. Throughout the Spring semester they have been working on a range of techniques to bolster and pack the punch into these arguments, as this piece of work contributes to their English Language GCSE.

To keep it relevant, all students addressed their letters to our local MP, Mr.Double, who oversees the St. Austell and Newquay constituency. Here at Fowey River Academy, we are lucky enough to have a strong connection and consequently have sent student's letters for him to read. Below are two exceptional examples from Bruno Colwil-Heap and Paris Richardson, take a look:

Dear Mr Double,

I am writing to you today to talk about the reintroduction of the death penalty. I believe capital punishment is unholy and uncivilised in today's society. As you're a conservative, you believe that everyone should have the best chance in life . With this being said, do you think that then serving them the death penalty Is giving them this? Therefore I do not believe that capital punishment is neither fair nor true.

Primarily, a reason for being against the death penalty is the fact that you are killing a innocent human being, who did not take anyone else's life. They did not take part in the horrific crime of murder or manslaughter, so I am baffled that anyone would agree that this is ethically or morally correct. There are other alternatives than taking someone's life. An example I could think of would be prison for life without parole. If you did this, you could investigate why that person did what they did and maybe help prevent it from happening to anyone else. In the case something like this may happen again, you would have learnt how to stop it because of the person you decided not to kill. This would also make it seem a lot easier for people to come to you for help because they know that you can help them.

Another big factor would be how both race and place in the social system play a massive part in how you will be treated if given the death penalty. If you are a place of high power or social status, then you would get treated differently to someone who was working class. And it is the same with race, people of colour have accounted for a disproportionate 43% of total executions since 1976 and 55% of those currently awaiting trial. We live in a world where in 60% of all countries have the right to murder an innocent human if THEY think necessary. So that means that someone who has a high status would have more of a chance of surviving than someone who was just a working human, even if they committed the same crime. Doesn't that sound unfair to you?

One more argument against this would be how much we pay for something more than 60% of the world disagrees with (according to deathpenaltyinfo.org). More than £1.26 million are spent on capital punishment every year. This money you could instead be spending on something that needs it a lot more important like the NHS who are currently extremely underfunded. If we look at a place like America where capital punishment is legal, you can see how the states with capital punishment have a higher murder than the states with no capital punishment. This is because they believe that they have nothing to live for. This has been a consistent trend from 1990 to current time.

drug that kills the Person at question pulling out, it is very hard to even. Get hold of it. This madness is that the person in question would be waiting for the day he or she would die without knowing when. This could drive any person into extreme dark thoughts and would not be a good thing to show the public. An example of someone who had been falsely executed would be Dontea Morris who was executed on June 25, 1989. He wasn't a murderer or anything like that, he was a schizophrenic who had the mental age of 8. And he was killed.

In conclusion, I think that capital punishment should not be legalised in the UK or anywhere for that matter. So please read and take into consideration what I have said.

We have our first Ten Tors team ever at Fowey River Academy - and despite 2020/21 probably being the worst year to start, as the event has been cancelled due to the Covid pandemic, our new team, drawn from Year 10, have stepped up again to prove their mettle, after we were able to resume training in March. We have been carrying full backpacks of camping gear since then, and have been lifting our fitness levels again after the enforced layoff. We have had 3 single days of training on Dartmoor - a foggy day, a sunny day and a challenging day of torrential rain - when the streams flooded and the team had to walk around the sources of the streams to get off the moor!

We had our first wild camping weekend on 22nd/23rd May - after a 12-mile walk navigating their way perfectly across Great Steeple Tor, White Barrow and Great Mis Tor, through Princetown to Peat Cott, the team camped in a wild but sheltered valley beside a babbling stream for the night, with the staff camping a little upstream. As the Sun went down, a cuckoo was calling almost non-stop. It was a beautiful, dry evening, although it went from chilly down to 1C overnight, which was a useful test of everyone's sleeping gear. On Sunday morning, the team showed off their excellent navigation again on the 5 mile walk back into Princetown to meet the minibus.

Looking ahead, we have one further 3-day, 2-night expedition on Bodmin Moor before the team attempt our own 35-mile Ten Tors challenge, to mimic the real event.

We are already planning for Ten Tors 2022 - it is looking likely that the current Year 10 team will go forwards to do the 45-mile challenge next year. We will shortly be asking for expressions of interest from the current Year 9s (next year's Year 10s) to join the new 35-mile team for next year.



The settings on an Android device allow you to prescribe certain rules for when your child is using it. For example, you can block specific types of content to reduce the risk of your child being exposed to age-inappropriate material (music with explicit lyrics, for instance, and games, TV shows or movies that are unsuitable for young people). There are two ways to access parental controls on an Android phone: through Google Play or via the Google Family Link app. You can also lock your changes behind a PIN, so your child (or anyone else) can't change them back.
